

1. Hutcheson's confirmation as FMCSA Administrator inches closer

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee advanced Robin Hutcheson's confirmation today (above) to a full vote on the Senate floor. The vote will be scheduled later.

Deputy Administrator Hutcheson has been leading the agency as acting administrator since January after Meera Joshi left to become a deputy mayor for New York City.

Hutcheson previously worked as the U.S. Department of Transportation's deputy secretary for safety policy in 2021.

Once confirmed, Hutcheson will become FMCSA's first permanent Administrator since Ray Martinez stepped down in October 2019.





The U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) today issued a notice of intent to move forward with a rulemaking to require the use of speed limiters for commercial motor vehicles (CMVs).

The notice of intent (NOI) provides a series of questions to gather information and data to assist FMCSA in drafting a Supplemental Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (SNPRM) to follow up on a September 7, 2016, joint proposal issued by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and FMCSA. The SNPRM would propose requiring interstate motor carriers that currently operate CMVs with electronic engine control units (ECUs) to set a maximum speed to be determined through the rulemaking process. After reviewing the public comments to the notice of intent, the future SNPRM will present the proposed regulators text, estimated costs, and safety benefits of using speed limited.

The National Road way Safety Strategy identified speed as a major factor in fatal crashes, and speed management as a primary tool to reduce serious injuries and fatalities. FMCSA envisions the rule as a commonsense approach to reducing crashes and saving lives as the agency continues to work must devel a for dworder on the STV 200 multiple wards a goal of zero lives lost on our nations are wards.

FMCSA is moving forward with this rulemaking because of concerns about the number of CMV crashes and fatalities traveling at high speeds. In 2019 alone, there were nearly 900 fatal crashes in areas with posted speed limits over 70 miles per hour.

Public responses will be accepted for 30 days once the NOI is published in the Federal Register. The NOI includes instructions on submitting responses to the rulemaking docket, at FMCSA-2022-0004.



Bus Roadway Departure and Rollover

Pala Mesa, California February 22, 2020

Abstract: On February 22, 2020, about 10:23 a.m. Pacific standard time, during a moderate rainfall, a 30-passenger bus left the southbound lanes of Interstate 15 just past a bridge over the San Luis Rey River and overturned in Pala Mesa, California. The bus was operated by Executive Lines Inc. and occupied by a 52-year-old driver and 20 passengers. While completing the crossing of the bridge, the driver lost control of the bus, which eventually departed the roadway to the right, traveled about 81 feet the bus, which eventually departed the roadway to the right, traveled across a 95-foot-wide clear zone, farther before it rolled over 1.5 times (540°), moved across a volucion with the embankment of the clear zone. The bus came to rest and slid about 16 feet down the embankment or the creat zone. The bus carried the end of the hridne dack.
